LITERATURE: FAMILY, SOCIETY AND THE INDIVIDUAL John Still

We shall discuss contrasting literary works that explore clashes between the individual and society; problems of love, work and bereavement; changing relationships between parents and children; and questions about the role of women. Texts include George Eliot's *The Mill on the Floss*, Harold Pinter's *The Homecoming*, Pat Barker's *Union Street*, and a selection of poems and short stories, including works by Thomas Hardy, T. S. Eliot, Elizabeth Bowen and Elizabeth Taylor.

MEDICINE THROUGH TIME: DISEASE, SURGERY AND PUBLIC HEALTH Joss Beattie

Pain, plague, penicillin, dirt, disease and dissection are all part of the fascinating story that is the history of medicine. Meet the individuals, examine the events, analyse the factors which have enabled humanity to move, one step at a time, through leaps of progress and hurdles of disappointment, from trephining to transfusion and transplants.

PLAYS AND PLAYERS: DRAMA AND MUSIC IN ART Peter Scott

We shall explore and appreciate the relationship between drama, music and art, and show how this inspired artists from ancient Greece and Rome to the present day. The emergence of the performer as a celebrity went hand in hand with the rise in the status of artists and gave us some powerful and lasting images. The course will begin with a look at some art and artefacts of the ancient world. We shall examine depictions of medieval drama and go on to later centuries and the emergence of celebrity. Other topics will include art and music, Shakespeare and art, the ballet, Picasso and Matisse, modern artists (for example David Hockney), the music hall, cinema and television.

READING LATIN LITERATURE Steve Kershaw

This course is aimed at those who have a pretty secure grasp of the fundamentals of the language and who would like to read some classic Roman texts in their original language. We will focus initially on the conclusion of the moving tale of Dido and Aeneas in Virgil's Aeneid, explore Tacitus' scintillating account of Boudicca's revolt, and read Pliny's astonishing letters describing the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 CE. Our discussions will extend beyond the nuances of language into fascinating aspects of Roman society and history. Students should have a reasonable working knowledge of all the major grammatical and syntactical constructions in Latin, and the course will be conducted in a light-hearted yet ridorous way. N.B. No meetings from 30 September to 21 October inclusive. Classes on 9 September, 28 October and 18 November 13.45 to 15.45 pm.

THE ART OF THE POSTER: A HISTORY OF ILLUSTRATED POSTERS Graham Twemlow

This course will celebrate the illustrated poster that had its beginnings in Paris during the last guarter of the nineteenth century. Works of the leading poster artists of the time, including Jules Chéret, Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, Alphonse Mucha, Pierre Bonnard, Paul Nash and Graham Sutherland, will be investigated. We will also examine groundbreaking travel posters produced in Britain in the inter-war period including the modernist works produced for Shell-Mex. The poster as a collector's item will be explored. Artefacts will be made available for students to view and discuss. **N.B.** No meeting on 5 November (study day).

MUSIC: SOUND REVOLUTIONS **Anthony Short**

Styles of musical performance have undergone remarkable changes over the centuries. This course aims to find out why musicians from different eras have taken such radically different approaches when presenting the same works. Agents of artistic change include social trends and fashions, but perhaps the single most revolutionary factor was the introduction of sound recording. Each session will be copiously illustrated with musical examples spanning almost 130 years. Other important questions will also be addressed, such as how 'authentic' are so-called 'historically informed' performances?

BLACK & YELLOW MAKE GREEN: USING ACRYLIC PAINT EFFECTIVELY Jo Hall

Learn how to get the most from your acrylic paints by understanding pigments with regard to hue, saturation, tonal value and transparency. After much colour mixing, and discovering by experiment how colours interact, we shall use glazing, collage and sgraffito techniques in still life studies.

Reference artists to include: Van Gogh, Matisse, Piet Mondrian, Josef Albers, Paul Klee, Bridget Riley and William Selby.

LITERATURE: LOVE, POWER and ILLUSION John Still

In the autumn we shall consider Shakespeare's *King Lear* and Tennessee Williams' *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof.* These contrasting works show how rivalries and deceptions disrupt family life and create challenging moral dilemmas. After Christmas we will discuss Shakespeare's study of problems of love and power in *Antony and Cleopatra;* and Eugene O'Neill's *The Iceman Cometh,* a fascinating play about illusion and reality.

PHILOSOPHY OF FAIRNESS Charlotte Newey

English speakers become acquainted with the persuasive power of the term 'fairness' from a very young age, yet in some languages there is no direct translation. This course examines what we mean when we talk about fairness. Does 'fairness' itself motivate us or is 'fairness' shorthand for a much more complex set of judgements? Are we all talking about the same thing when we say something is fair? Perhaps fairness is reflected in people getting what they need, deserve, or are entitled to but what do we do when these come into conflict? Although some experience of philosophy would be helpful, the course is open to everyone.

NOVEMBER STUDY DAY 2015

TO PROVE MYSELF A VILLAIN? History, Controversy and the Idea of Tyranny Kate Watson

This course examines four key figures who have each, in different ways, left dramatic marks on popular history and memory: Richard III, Oliver Cromwell, Maximilien Robespierre and Vladimir Lenin. Each man came to power in dramatic circumstances in the wake of war, revolution, civil strife or absolutism, when the very existence of their states seemed threatened. Although, in each case, the process of acquiring power brought with it the apparent reek of tyranny, each man played a major role in the shaping of his state, not only in his own time, but far into the future. In doing so, they proved to be highly controversial characters, inspiring admiration and even veneration in some, but bitterness and loathing in others. Yet how true is either image of such men? And how far have historians helped to support or challenge each interpretation?

This study day will seek to explore these questions, and others, by examining the realities of the time in which each man lived and the nature of the power they each wielded. Finally we will ask just how much of their legacy remains – and imagine what life might have been like without them!

MASTERPIECES OF ART NOUVEAU Dalila Castelijn

The course focuses on the art and architecture produced in Europe between 1890 and the First World War. Inspired by the natural world, artists such as Beardsley, Charles Rennie Mackintosh, Jan Toorop, Klimt and Emile Gallé established a style based on sinuous lines, elongated forms and the use of exotic materials. Art Nouveau architecture flourished in major European cities with Gaudi, Otto Wagner, Hector Guimard and Horta, who aimed to create buildings appropriate for the modern world.

THE ARCHITECTS OF THE ITALIAN RENAISSANCE Keith Hasted

From Brunelleschi to Michelangelo, many of the most influential Renaissance architects served their early apprenticeships as sculptors, painters and even goldsmiths. How they mastered this new skill and produced such extraordinary and inventive re-interpretations of the architecture of Greece and Rome is a fascinating story.

READING GREEK LITERATURE Steve Kershaw

This course is aimed at those who have a pretty secure grasp of the fundamentals of the language and who would like to read some classic Greek texts in their original language. We will read Herodotos' story of Adrastos (one of the most powerful and tragic in all the author's writings) and the fabulous tale of Odysseus and Nausikaa from Homer's *Odyssey*. In the process of reading these texts we will also concentrate on securing and developing the fundamentals of the language through an examination of the Ancient Greeks and their literature. This will involve a light-hearted yet rigorous exploration of the Greek language and its influence today. Students should anticipate being able to read, understand, and make an informed personal response to the original material. **N.B.** No classes on 13 January and 10 February. Class in half term week on 17 February.

FROM THE SCIENTIFIC REVOLUTION TO THE MODERN AGE Paul Ranford

An account of the development of science from about 1800 (the Newtonian cosmos) through nineteenth century advances in thermodynamics, biology, geology, medicine, astronomy, electromagnetism and atomic structure, all leading to late twentieth century particle physics theories. (No weighty theory involved!) Note change in meeting length to 2 hours 15 mins.

Each week you will be taken step by step through the process resulting in your very own 'figure in the landscape' picture.

This is a hands-on course and includes a local field trip to collect our own fossils.

EVENING COURSE IN COOKHAM DEAN 2015

CONTEMPORARY EUROPEAN FILMMAKERS: AN ANALYSIS OF STYLE Wickham Clayton

This course aims to look at the careers and individual styles of six European filmmakers active within the last thirty-five years, specifically: Pedro Almodóvar (Spain; *The Flower of My Secret*, 1995; *Volver*, 2006), Jean-Pierre Jeunet (France; *Delicatessen*, 1991; *The Very Long Engagement*, 2004; [*Amélie*, 2001, optional – will be discussed]), Wim Wenders (Germany; *Alice in the Cities*, 1974; *Wings of Desire*, 1987), Paul Verhoeven (Netherlands; *The Fourth Man*, 1983; *Black Book*, 2006), Paolo Sorrentino (Italy; *The Consequences of Love*, 2004; *The Great Beauty*, 2013) and Mike Leigh (UK; *Naked*, 1993; *Mr Turner*, 2014). The course will help familiarise students with modern filmmakers, the elements of style, and how to understand and analyse the elements of film form. DVDs of films will be available to borrow from May 2015.

EVENING COURSE IN MAIDENHEAD 2016

ANCIENT GREEK THEATRE Steve Kershaw

Tragedy and comedy form part of Ancient Greece's greatest legacy. Greek drama is a unique combination of drama, poetry, music, dance, religion, politics, high art and popular culture in an art form that has survived for thousands of years. This course will explore the origins and development of these genres, their dramatic conventions and the social and architectural context of their performance. We shall study some of the greatest works of world theatre in high quality English translation: Aeschylus' mighty *Agamemnon;* Sophocles' deeply tragic *Oedipus the King;* Euripides uncanny 'avant garde' *Medea;* the bizarre satyr plays that were performed alongside the tragedies; Aristophanes' hilarious and bawdy comedy *Frogs;* the development of the architecture of the Greek theatre complex; and the influence these plays have had since Antiquity. As Rita so memorably said in Willy Russell's *Educating Rita,* "It's fun, tragedy, isn't it?"

¹ Change to Length of Courses

The WEA is funded by the Government through the Skills Funding Agency. Changes to the funding rules have meant that we have needed to amend some course lengths.
